General Information and Hālau Policies

WINTER 2025

- Hālau Hula Aulani LLC is located at 1437 NE Dee St. Roseburg, OR 97470. Polynesian dance classes are instructed here by nā kumu hula Tiffani Malialani Parker and Sharon Aulani Smith. Other alaka'i (leaders) in the hālau will sometimes teach classes under the guidance of kumu Tiffani or kumu Sharon. Guest instructors will occasionally be invited to teach special classes or workshops at the hālau.
- WINTER 2025 session runs for **8 weeks, beginning Monday, January 29th and ending Thursday, March 20th**. There will be no performance opportunities until Spring of 2025.
- Payments are accepted in the forms of cash, check, Venmo or credit card. Please make checks payable to: Hālau Hula Aulani and Venmo @Tiffani-Parker-6. Credit card payments can be made in the office via square. A 3% fee will be assessed on credit card payments. If paying cash, please place the exact amount owed in an envelope (provided) with your name and amount written on the envelope and place it in the drop box in the foyer. Checks may also be dropped here. If you are paying for more than one student or multiple items, please specify with a clear memo.
- **Current fees are \$60 per month for 60-minute classes, \$45 per month for 45-minute classes, and \$30 per month for 30-minute classes. The cost remains the same regardless of attendance. Your enrollment in Hālau Hula Aulani means we are reserving your spot in a class that could have been filled by another student. Any requests to put a hold on your account (temporarily discontinue your billing) must be communicated in writing prior to the first of the month, specifically indicating that you wish to HOLD your account and are becoming inactive in the hālau for the specified timeframe. Please email aloha@oregonhula.com to communicate this. Accounts must be in good standing to register for future sessions. Please pay no later than the 10th of each month to avoid late fees. There is a one-time registration fee of \$25 for NEW students. Class fees are subject to change.**
- Discounts are available for prompt payment. For the 2025 Winter session (8 weeks), the cost for a 60-minute class is \$104 if paid by January 30th. Shorter classes are discounted at the same rate (45-minute class \$78, 30-minute class \$52.) For those who miss the prompt payment deadline, the monthly rate will apply. **The prompt pay option is non-refundable. No exceptions.** Most months have 4 classes per month although some have more or less than that depending on how the weeks fall within the month. For the sake of simplicity, the monthly rate will remain the same regardless of the number of classes in any given month within the 8-week session. Exceptions will be made for late starts where the dancer's first month only will be prorated.
- 'Ori Tahiti Skills & Drills class is open to all ages and skill levels. The focus of this class will be on dance fitness and personal improvement pertinent to 'Ori Tahiti (Tahitian dance). The cost is \$60 per month or discounted to \$104 for 8 weeks paid in full by January 30th. If also enrolled in hula, the Haumāna Rate for 'Ori Tahiti is \$45 per month or discounted to \$78 for 8 weeks with the prompt pay option. Please bring a water bottle, towel, and your pareo to every 'Ori Tahiti class. **Drop ins welcome in this class only at \$15 per class.**
- Haumāna hula (students) should bring a practice pa'u skirt and a water bottle to every class. Retired costumes from your own collection or from friends who have outgrown their pa'u make wonderful practice pa'u. If you do not have a practice pa'u, we have some for sale in the foyer. Some find it comfortable to wear leggings or athletic attire under their pa'u for practice. Don't forget to remove your shoes before entering the dance studio. Other things to bring to every class include a notepad and pen, a folder for handouts, and any hula implements you own. It is good practice to care for your own implements and bring them with you to class.

- Students will have unique individual attire/costume requirements depending on the dances to be performed throughout the season and what they already own from previous years. Costume fees will be communicated to student/responsible party as soon as they're determined. You will be responsible for crafting, sewing or assembling pieces of your own costumes. This is customary in being part of any hālau hula. When required, we will demonstrate how to do this. Since the final prices of costumes will include and reflect postage fees (shipped from Hawai'i or elsewhere) and/or changes based on materials availability, we will do our best to accurately relay cost information but please note that minor changes or unexpected extra costs will sometimes occur. Costumes are custom ordered and tailored for each student. Sometimes we can buy costumes back (used) from previous years but not always. Often, when we do buy costumes back, cleaning, mending, and altering is required. **Costume fees are due at the time of ordering. Please note that all attire/costumes and accessories are non-refundable once ordered.** It is difficult to keep track of everything needed by each student. Sometimes we might assume you have something at home that you no longer have. Please be diligent in letting us know ASAP if a costume or accessory has been misplaced/damaged/does not fit, so that we can attempt to obtain a replacement. **The preferred way to communicate your costume needs is through a note in the foyer drop box.** Please take good care of your costumes. Store them in a box (large flat storage box with lid works nicely) or on hangers. Wrinkled, dirty, poor-fitting, or sun-damaged, and/or unfinished costumes are not permitted for any performance. This determination will ultimately be made by your kumu.
- Throughout the season we may have community performances/shows. Participation in shows is optional although we do hope you can attend as many as possible when invited. The length of each show varies, as does the number of students and guests we can have at each. We will not invite every class to every show. Sometimes we will invite all classes, but we will not get to perform every dance. Each show is tailored to the needs/wants of the host regarding its duration, size and level of professionalism. We will have sign-up sheets with more information as they are booked. **Just because you are paying for lessons/own the costumes does NOT guarantee the option to perform. Performing with Hālau Hula Aulani is a privilege. If it is apparent that you are unready/unable to perform something at the level that is expected of you, you will be asked not to perform at that time. This determination is made at the sole, creative discretion of your kumu (teacher). For planning purposes, please note that there is no large Hō'ike scheduled for 2025.**
- **All dances shared with Haumāna in class are proprietary to Hālau Hula Aulani. Please do not teach dances to anyone outside of the Hālau without expressed permission from your kumu. Please do not represent Hālau Hula Aulani in public or online outside of events organized by your kumu or instructor without obtaining permission first.** As an example: if you wish to perform at a public event, for your school or for your pageant, we want to work with you to ensure authenticity and accuracy in your representation, to the best of our knowledge and ability. Mahalo for respecting this request.
- As a courtesy to dancers, Hālau Hula Aulani makes DVDs and digital videos available for practice at home. Each DVD or digital file costs \$3 per dance. DVDs are provided by Hālau Hula Aulani and are available for sale in the foyer. If you prefer to have a digital copy of the dance, please drop a flash drive labeled with your name into the drop box with a note specifying which dances to load; we will do our best to return it to you at the next class. Please do not share DVDs or digital copies of dances with anyone outside of Hālau Hula Aulani. We do encourage you to support Hawaiian music artists by purchasing your own copies of the music (this is not applicable to practice videos or cut music).
- Other important things: Please show kindness in the Hālau; Respect your kumu, instructors and hula sisters always; Act positively out in the local community and online communities as you are representing Hālau Hula Aulani and are a part of something traditional, wholesome, and bigger than yourself; Do everything you can to embrace the culture that you are representing: take outside workshops, follow hula masters on social media, read books, learn 'ōlelo Hawai'i, immerse yourselves in the culture, visit the islands in a responsible and respectful way, make Hawaiian crafts, enjoy local food; This is a lifelong journey and we all bring different backgrounds, skills and life experiences into our pursuit of hula. Just keep moving forward with a humble heart. Here's an 'ōlelo no'eau to keep with you as Haumāna hula:

“A'a i ka hula. Waiho i ka hilahila i ka hale. E kaupe aku no i ka hoe, e ko mai i ka hoe, e hoe.”

“Dare to dance. Leave embarrassment at home. Put forward the paddle, draw the paddle toward you, paddle.”

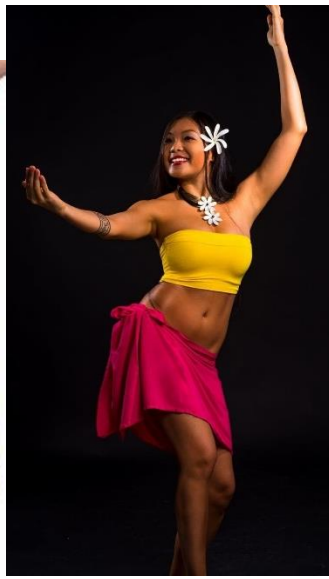
